The function of dance in Latin/o American culture is the focus of the essays collected in *Everynight Life*. The contributors interpret how Latin/o culture expresses itself through dance, approaching the material

from the varying perspectives of literary, cultural, dance, performance, queer, and feminist studies. Viewing dance as privileged sites of identity formation and cultural resistance in Latin/o America, *Everynight Life* translates the motion of bodies into speech, and the gestures of dance into a provocative socio-political grammar. This anthology looks at many modes of dance—including salsa,

merengue, cumbia, rumba, mambo, tango, samba, and norteño—as models for the interplay of cultural memory and regional conflict. Barbara Browning's essay on capoeira, for instance, demonstrates how dance has been used as a literal form of resistance, while José Piedra explores the meanings conveyed by women of color dancing the rumba. Pieces such as Gustavo Perez Fírmát's "I Came, I Saw, I Conga'd"

Pero como todo se aprende escudriñando quizás este libro toque la sensibilidad

de aquellos que buscan un poco del pasado de sus antepasados, de cómo eran las cosas que ahora ya no son. Además podrán ver la fructífera creatividad de nuestro reconocido personaje y la internacionalidad de su trabajo literario que muchos hoy quisieran obtener. La mayoría de los escritores influyentes de cualquier país sea cual sea su género físico y literario reflejan en sus escritos las condiciones de vida que les afectaron o disturban emocionalmente en su

crecimiento intelectual y las que influyen durante su carrera como escritor. Para aquellos que no conocen he aquí a manera de presentación algunos de sus temas y pensamientos en su expresión literaria: El fenómeno nacionalista puertorriqueño, la industrialización y sus consecuencias morales, psicológicas y sociales, la participación del puertorriqueño en la guerra de Corea, el Tiempo como problema filosófico y la soledad existencial del Hombre, el feminismo

puertorriqueño; además lo primordialmente urbano: calles, fábricas, edificios de apartamentos, postes de alumbrado público, hilos telefónicos, luces de neón, anuncios comerciales, aeropuertos, tiendas, torres de acero, casuchas arrabaleras, hoteles para turistas, prostíbulos, restaurantes, autobuses, bares, en fin, todo lo que se ofrece diariamente a la visión del habitante de la ciudad, integra el "paisaje... etc.", así era la literatura de René Marqués. Según Angelina Morfi quién fue

una de sus grandes amigas personales y literarias dice; "René Marqués es uno de los escritores más representativos de nuestro espíritu nacional de los más conscientes de los males de la colonia. Nos lega una obra importante, no sólo por su valor literario sino también por lo que aporta al conocimiento de nuestro auténtico modo de ser". Fue en ARECIBO, en cuyas costas el mar Atlántico ha demostrado secularmente su furia nace René Marqués el 4

de octubre de 1919. Desde niño vive interesantes y agradables experiencias a través de familiares, paisanos en general, libros, espectáculos, la tierra y el mar que rendirían su fruto en una rica obra literaria. El cine y el teatro los disfruta tempranamente por la afición que les tenía su madre doña Pura García Abreu. Las representaciones de dramas, comedias, operetas, zarzuelas y revistas españolas se cuentan entre los estímulos iniciales que lo

encaminaron al fascinante mundo del espectáculo. Su padre Juan Marqués prefería pasar las noches en las tertulias nocturnas pero si había algún encuentro de 'boxeo se desplazaba al cuadrilátero en compañía de su unigénito. Acostumbraba también llevarlo a las series dominicales de cine y al circo en su temporada de Arecibo. René Marqués se gradúa de agrónomo en 1942 en el Colegio de Agricultura y Artes Mecánicas. El mismo año se casa con Serena

Velasco. De la unión nacen Raúl Fernando, Brunilda María y Francisco René. El matrimonio queda disuelto tres lustros después. Los últimos años de su vida René Marqués se aísla en una bella región campestre en Cubuy de Canóvanas. El no y una densa vegetación circundaban la casa de elegante y sobrio diseño realizado por José Manuel Lacomba, su amigo inseparable. Muere el 22 de marzo de 1979 en el Hospital. Anger takes creative  
rather than polemical  
form in ten stories that

started Ferré on her way to becoming a leading woman writer in Latin America. The upper-middle-class women in *The Youngest Doll*, mostly married to macho men, rebel against their doll-like existence or retreat into fantasy, those without money or the right skin color are even more oppressed. In terms of power and influence, these women stand in the same relation to men as Puerto Rico itself does to the United States, and Ferré stretches artistic boundaries in writing

about their situation. The stories, moving from the realistic to the nightmarish, are deeply, felt, full of irony and black humor, often experimental in form. The imagery is striking: an architect dreams about a beautiful bridge that “would open and close its arches like alligators making love”; a Mercedes Benz “shines in the dark like a chromium rhinoceros.” One story, “The Sleeping Beauty,” is a collage of letters, announcements, and photo captions that allows

chilling conclusions to be drawn from what is not written. The collection includes Ferré’s discussion of “When Women Love Men,” a story about a prostitute and a society lady who unite in order to survive, and one that illustrates the woman writer’s “art of disassembling anger through irony.” In closing, she considers how her experience as a Latin American woman with ties to the United States has brought to her writing a dual cultural perspective. **Guaya Guaya** Hassell
