Marine geochemistry uses chemical elements and their isotopes to study how the ocean works in terms of ocean circulation, chemical composition, biological activity and atmospheric CO<sub>2</sub> regulation. This rapidly growing field is at a crossroad for many disciplines (physical, chemical and biological

oceanography, geology, climatology, ecology, etc.). It provides important quantitative answers to questions such as: What is the deep ocean mixing rate? How much atmospheric CO<sub>2</sub> is pumped by the ocean? How fast are pollutants removed from the ocean? How do ecosystems react to anthropogenic pressure?
