The Rules of Art Holt McDougal

This book offers a fresh reflection on The Book of Questions by the French-Egyptian Jewish writer Edmond Jabès and its readings, and proposes to re-contextualize this enigmatic writing through the lens of the author's manuscripts. Addressed are the main prisms through which Jabès' oeuvre has been read since its publication in 1963: Jewishness, the Shoah, intertextuality with Midrash and Kabbalah, hermeticism and interpretation.
