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 Before the nineteenth century, instrumental music was  
 considered inferior to vocal music. Kant described wordless music  
 as "more pleasure than culture," and Rousseau dismissed it for its  
 inability to convey concepts. But by the early 1800s, a dramatic

shift was under way. Purely instrumental music was now being  
 hailed as a means to knowledge and embraced precisely because  
 of its independence from the limits of language. What had once  
 been perceived as entertainment was heard increasingly as a  
 vehicle of thought. Listening had become a way of knowing.

 attitudes toward listening in the late eighteenth and early  
 nineteenth centuries. Focusing on responses to the symphony in

In the summer of 1998 two of baseball leading sluggers, Mark McGwire and Sammy Sosa, embarked on a race to break Babe Ruth's single season home run record. The nation was transfixed as Sosa went on to hit 66 home runs, and McGwire 70. Three years later, San Francisco Giants All-Star Barry Bonds surpassed McGwire by 3 home runs in the midst of what was perhaps the greatest offensive display in baseball history.
