It's called the Nautilus, and was built by the mysterious Captain Nemo. Fortunately he lets the multinational crew live long enough to go exploring with him. One last thing: don't let the name 20,000 Leagues Under the Sea fool you. 20K leagues is over two and a half times the circumference of the Earth. The title refers to the total distance they traveled: 20,000 leagues. Enjoy!

Thus, the book has been able to age well because of its scientific theories, unlike some of Verne's other works, like *Journey to the Center of the Earth*, which are not scientifically accurate and serve more simply as adventure novels.

"*Twenty Thousand Leagues Under The Sea*" is a classic science fiction novel by Jules Verne published in 1870. "The deepest parts of the ocean are totally unknown to us," admits Professor Aronnax early in this novel. "What goes on in those distant depths? What creatures inhabit, or could inhabit, those regions twelve or fifteen miles beneath the surface of the water? It's almost beyond conjecture." Jules Verne (1828-1905) published the French equivalent of these words in 1869, and little has changed since. 126 years later, a Time cover story on deep-sea exploration made much the same admission: "We know more about Mars than we know about the oceans." oceanic, the true genesis of what eventually became *Twenty Thousand Leagues Under The Sea* was first planted in the author's mind via an offhand comment in an 1865 communiqué from French author George Sand. Waxing rhapsodic about the author's then-latest opus, 1864's *Journey to the Center of the Earth*, Madame Sand playfully prodded Verne to, in his next work, "take us to the depths of the sea...in diving vessels that your science and imagination will manage to improve." Diving into this challenge with gusto, Verne began development on what eventually became *Twenty Thousand Leagues* that same year. From the beginning, he was uncertain of precisely how large a distance his submarine would travel, with working titles ranging from *Twenty-Five Thousand Leagues Under the Waters* to *A Thousand Leagues Under the Oceans* to the more-familiar *Twenty Thousand Leagues Under the Waters* before arriving at the book's final designation (at one point he even considered titling it simply *Voyage Under the Waters*).
