telephone calls, and face-to-face meetings-increasingly interacted with other world leaders. Historians and political scientists have overlooked the central role that leader-to-leader diplomacy came to play in the conduct of US foreign affairs and what it meant for presidential leadership at home and abroad. To address this oversight, the study spans the history of the presidency from Franklin Roosevelt to Bill Clinton.
