Student Engagement Definition One recent Gallup study including 128 schools and more than 110,000 students found that student engagement and hope were significantly positively related to student academic achievement progress... Focus on Student Engagement for Better Academic Outcomes Student engagement typically includes three dimensions: • Behavioral engagement,

focusing on participation in academic, social, and co-curricular activities • Emotional engagement, focusing on the extent and nature of positive and negative reactions to teachers, classmates, academics, and school • Cognitive engagement, focusing on students' level of investment in learning Student engagement is a function of both the individual and the construct.

I. WHAT IS STUDENT ENGAGEMENT AND WHY IS IT IMPORTANT? Student 'engagement' is generally thought of in terms of cognitive engagement but cognitive engagement proceeds motivation. Some students will be motivated by a parent in the room with them at home, while others may want to 'please the teachers' and still others may be motivated by a letter grade.⁹
