Amontillado', 'The Fall of the House of Usher', and 'The Tell-Tale Heart'. With many of his stories adapted for TV and screen, including the gothic 2014 film 'Stonehearst Asylum', starring Kate Beckinsale, Michael Caine, and Ben Kingsley, Poe continues to influence literature, film, and television to this day.
