The career of Spain's celebrated author Carmen Martín Gaité spanned the Spanish Civil War, Franco's dictatorship, and the nation's transition to democracy. Approaches to Teaching the Works of Carmen Martín Gaité Harvill Secker

This book reconstructs the poetics of Carmen Martín Gaité by viewing the concept of journey as a fundamental principle upon which she bases and elaborates her narrative writing of the 1990s. Five novels published in this period receive critical attention, all of which coincide with the last trips taken by the writer to New York: *Caperucita en Manhattan* (1990), *Nubosidad variable* (1992), *La reina de las nieves* (1994), *Lo raro es vivir* (1996) and *Irse de casa* (1998). To the extent that the journey is the essence of the narrative under consideration, the concept is analysed as an aesthetic practice and an attempt to identify a series of actions, which allow us to link the writer's novels with two areas that have previously received only scant critical scrutiny: geography and the visual dimension. This book presents a comparative and interdisciplinary analysis of space in Martín Gaité's narrative as well as in her collages, drawings and paintings.
