In the 1990s, American civil society got upended and reordered as many social, cultural, political, and economic institutions

Using mostly migrant workers and township dwellers, and staging guerrilla-raid productions in black areas, Fugard frequently came into conflict with the government, forcing him to take his work overseas. Consequently, powerful plays such as *The Blood Knot*, *Sizwe Bansi is Dead*, and *Master Harold... and the boys* came to broadcast the inequities of the Apartheid-era to the world. Fugard's work retains an insistent influence, and is studied and performed the world over.
