He was also a poet of note, a literary critic

He demonstrates how knowledge of Bello's contributions illuminate not

only Latin American history, but also current issues of imperial fragmentation, nationalism and language. s against Spanish rule and his awakening political consciousness, his loyalist guardians banish him to the countryside, where he witnesses firsthand the Spaniards' violent repression and rebels' valiant resistance that crystallize both his personal destiny and that of his country. access to Juan de la Rosa for the very first time.
